

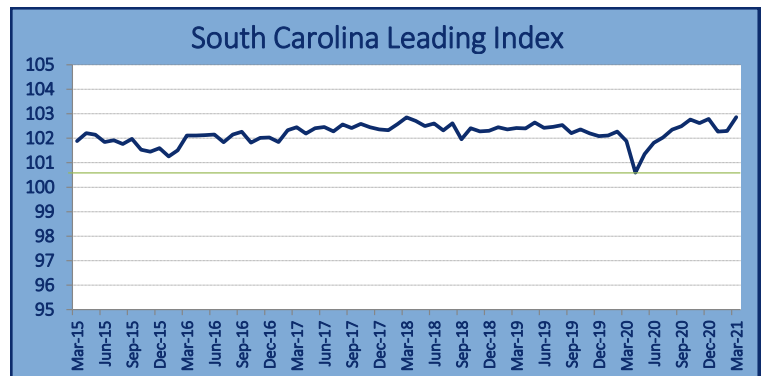

ECONOMIC OUTLOOK

The South Carolina Leading Index (SCLI) rose sharply last month, to a value (following revisions) of 102.86.

SCLI metrics were all improved in March. Unemployment claims were 19.2 percent lower than in February. The number of issued housing permits increased 23.9 percent month-over-month and valuation for the permits rose 27.6 percent. Average weekly manufacturing hours rose 4.0 percent. The Dow Jones Composite Average was up 8.0 percent.

The Conference Board's national Leading Economic Index increased in March to 111.6. This reading points to an accelerating economy, as index readings above 100 forecast economic expansion.

Non-Seasonally Adjusted Wage and Salary Employment

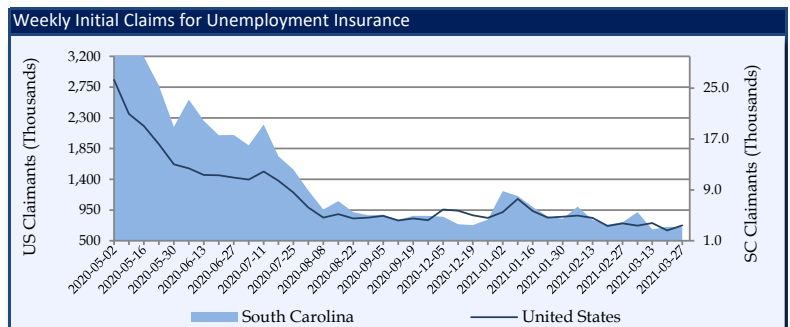
South Carolina's total non-seasonally adjusted nonfarm employment rose by 16,400 net jobs to 2,108,300 in March, a 0.8 percent increase from revised February numbers but 3.7 percent lower than one year ago. Nearly all sectors reported net job gains for the month, including Leisure and Hospitality (8,300); Trade, Transportation and Utilities (3,100); Construction (1,700); Government (1,000); Manufacturing (600); Other Services (600); Educational and Health Services (500); Finance (500); and Professional and Business Services (200). Net job losses were reported in the Information sector (-100). Natural Resources and Mining was unchanged from February. Compared to one year ago, the state economy lost 81,700 net nonfarm jobs.

Weekly Unemployment Claims

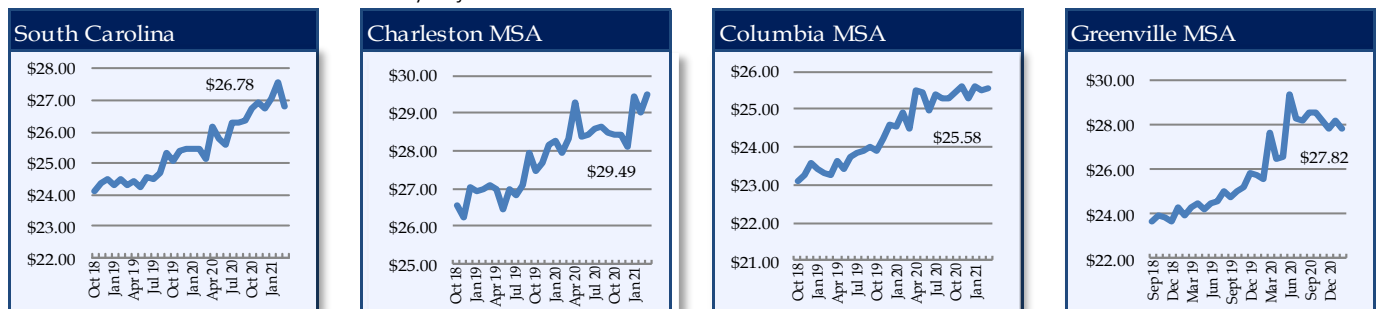
The average number of initial reported claims for unemployment insurance in the state decreased in March. The average for the month was 3,648 weekly initial claims, a 19.2 percent decrease month-over-month.

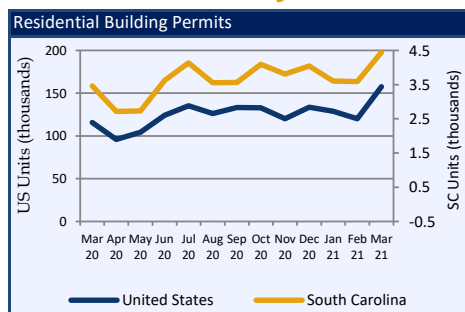
Real Estate & Business Activity

In March, the number of building permits issued in South Carolina for new residential construction rose 23.9 percent to 4,444. This figure was up 28.4 percent from one year ago. Valuation for the permits rose 27.6 percent month-over-month, topping \$1 billion for the first time. Total closings were up 39.7 percent compared to February, while the median sales price was up 2.1 percent. Total closings rose in all of the top six MSAs, with Myrtle Beach reporting the strongest gain (49.3 percent). Median sales price rose in four of the MSAs, with Florence reporting the only decline (-4.7 percent). The Myrtle Beach median sales price was unchanged month-over-month.

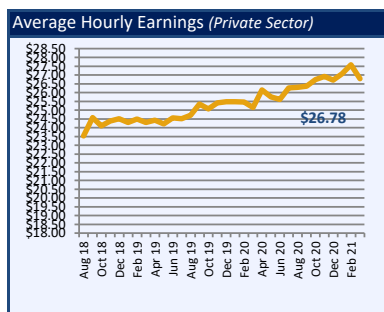

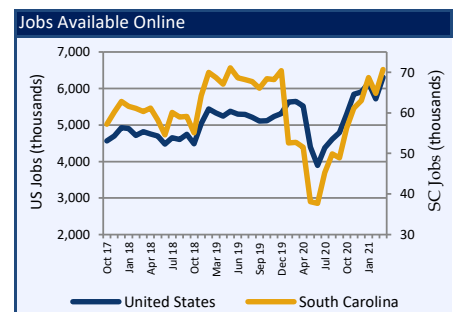

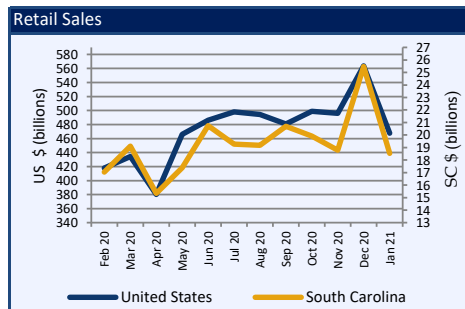

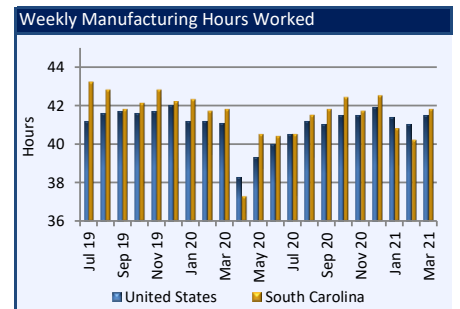

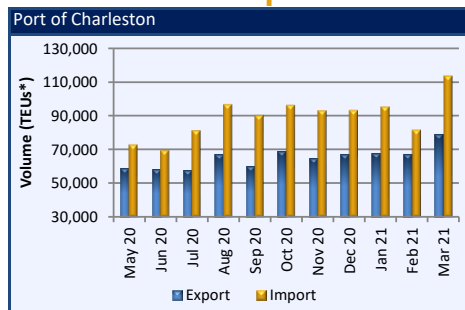

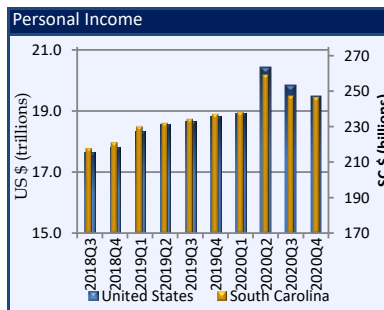

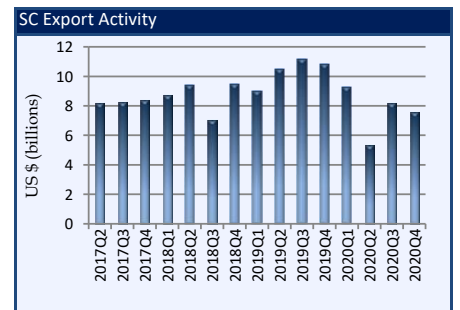
Income and Output
