

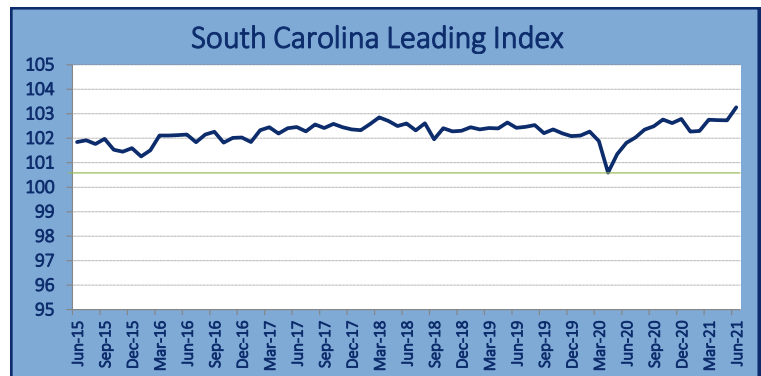

ECONOMIC OUTLOOK

The South Carolina Leading Index (SCLI) rose last month to a value (following revisions) of 103.26.

Most SCLI metrics improved in June. Unemployment claims were 31.2 percent lower than in May. The number of issued housing permits rose 42.3 percent month-over-month and valuation for the permits rose 19.7 percent. Average weekly manufacturing hours rose 1.9 percent. The Dow Jones Composite Average was down 1.9 percent.

The Conference Board's national Leading Economic Index increased in June to 115.1. This points to an accelerating economy, as index readings above 100 forecast economic expansion.

Non-Seasonally Adjusted Wage and Salary Employment

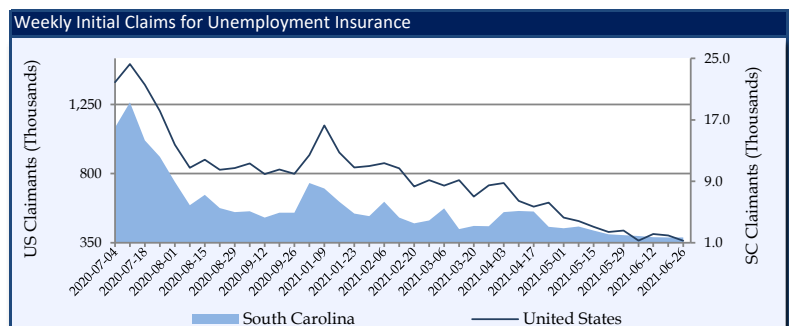
South Carolina's total non-seasonally adjusted nonfarm employment rose by 15,200 net jobs to 2,137,300 in June, a 0.7 percent increase from revised May numbers and 2.7 percent higher than one year ago. Most sectors reported net job gains for the month, including Leisure and Hospitality (9,000); Trade, Transportation and Utilities (5,800); Manufacturing (1,400); Construction (1,400); Other Services (1,300); Professional and Business Services (1,100); Finance (700); Information (200); and Natural Resources and Mining (100). Net job losses were reported in the Government (-5,400) and Educational and Health Services (-400) sectors. Compared to one year ago, the state economy added 56,300 net nonfarm jobs.

Weekly Unemployment Claims

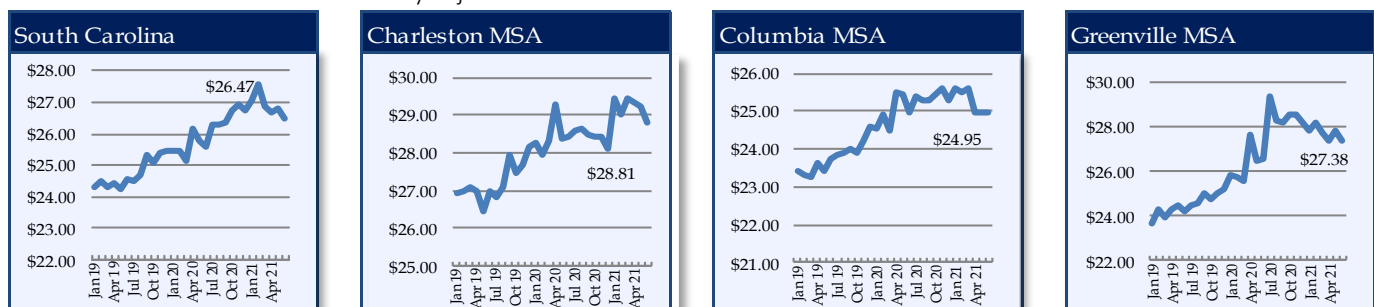

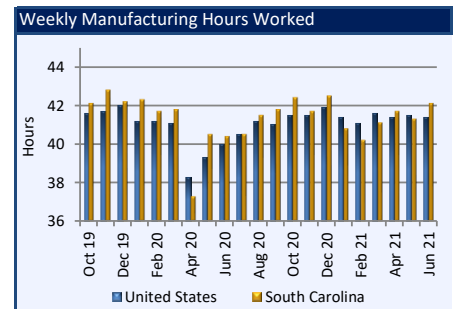
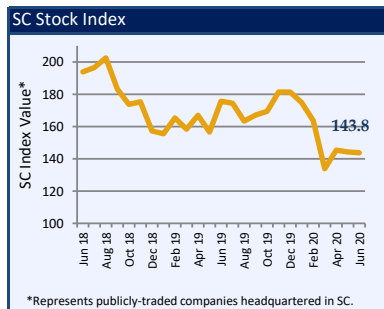
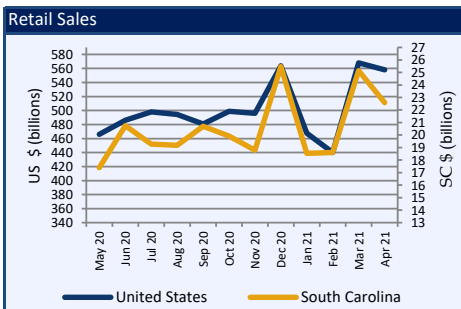
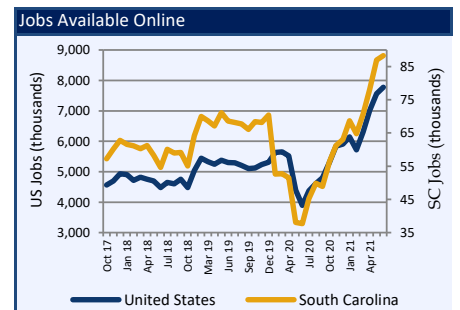
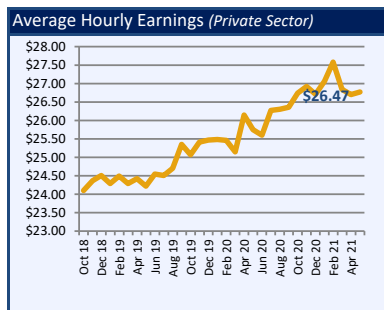
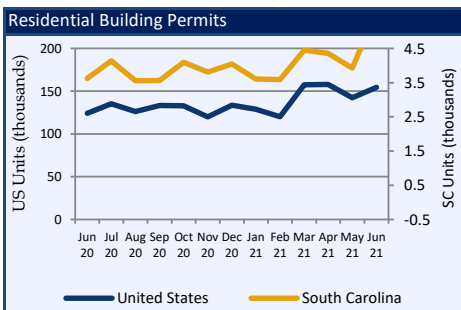
Real Estate & Business Activity

In June, the number of building permits issued in South Carolina for new residential construction rose 42.3 percent to 5,588. This figure was up 54.2 percent from one year ago. Valuation for the permits rose 19.7 percent month-over-month, and was 32.1 percent higher than one year ago. Total closings were up 14.3 percent compared to May, while the median sales price was up 3.6 percent. Total closings among the top six MSAs rose across the board, with Florence reporting the largest boost (32.7 percent). Median sales price rose in five of the MSAs, with Florence reporting the only decline (-7.9 percent).

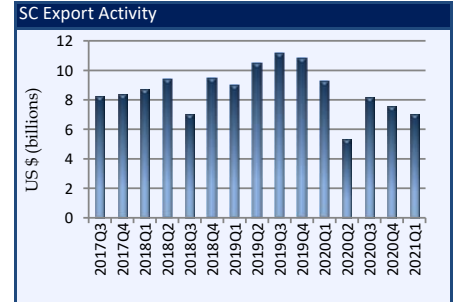
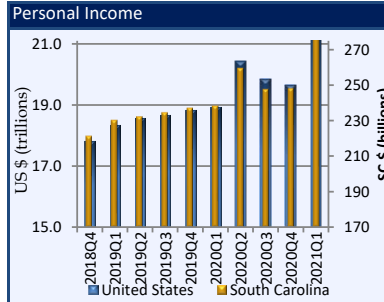
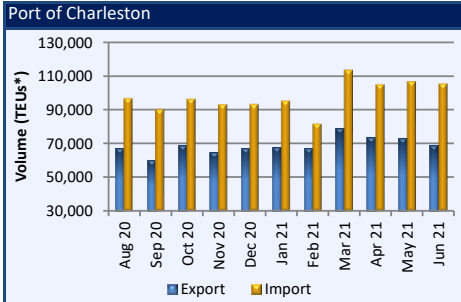

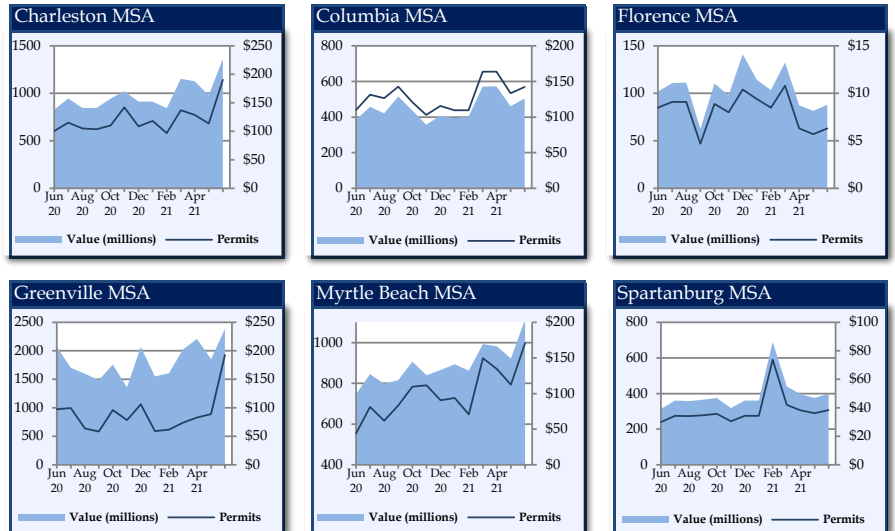

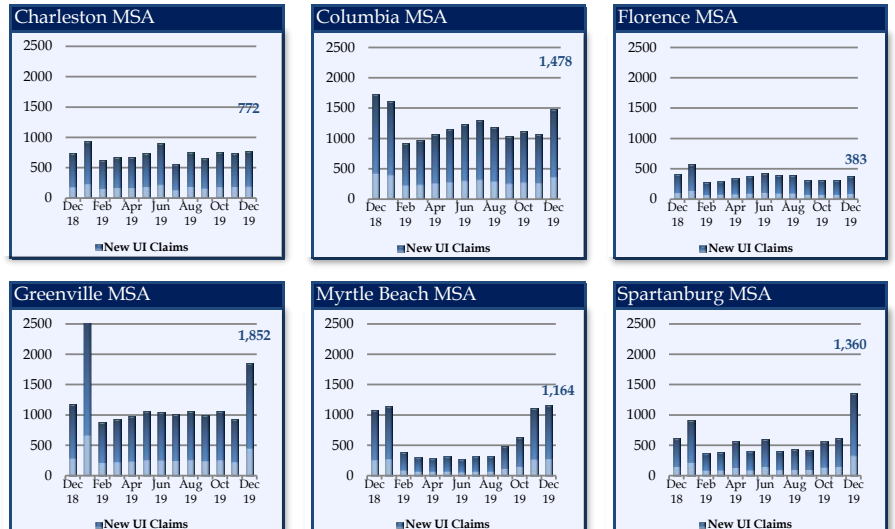
